With the help of her family and friends, can Mindy find a way to still enjoy her old holiday traditions, and create new ones along the way?



The simple, yet profound aim of the book I AM ME is to show young girls that they are amazing, and that they have everything within them to accomplish all their dreams and goals.



wrong.





This beautifully illustrated volume tells Malala's story for a younger audience and shows them the worldview that allowed Malala to hold on to hope even in the most difficult of times.


